ROSS & PATRICIA CHRISTENSEN "Ross D. Christensen Family Fund"

Dr. Ross Christensen was born in Atlantic, Iowa, in the home in which he grew up. His father, Svend, immigrated from Denmark and his mother, Kaye, immigrated from Scotland with her family.

Dr. Christensen left Atlantic and received a BS and DDS from the University of Iowa, then his Masters in Orthodontics in 1966.

They moved back to Iowa because of an orthodontic practice opportunity, and they felt that the quality of life here would be beneficial to their young family. The family orthodontic practice was successful, and in 1994, Greg officially joined the practice. Additionally, the Christensens owned Heartland Inns until 1998, where Pat served as the marketing director from 1983-1994.

In addition to his longtime career as an orthodontist, he was also a community leader. The Christensens' involvement in the Waterloo community is extensive.
